

Imago Dei Discussion Guide

In Middle School and High School, you begin to really notice the differences in physical appearance as well as cultural practices that your classmates and friends may have that are different than yours. Many times, we can feel uneasy about these differences, as we may not always know how to approach them in conversations with others. The truth of these characteristics is that we are all still made in the image of God, or, Imago Dei. Due to people having their own "truths" opposed to the truth that everyone is created in the image of God, we hear about events that take place in our world that seem to divide our country. Since there are people in the world that don't use scripture as their main reference point, there is a conflict that divides us. We've seen it time and time again on social media, the news, and we've heard about it in school.
