PLAN FOR LIVING — AND GIVING

Walking their talk characterizes one couple at The Loop Campus: shedding some of the "stuff" allows a streamlined approach to living a life of freedom and generosity.

Houston's First members Walter and Julia Wright tied the knot 11 years ago when they were about 40, in established careers — and debt free. That, however, didn't keep them from sharpening their financial skills in Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University (FPU). The principles they gleaned continued to positively affect their generosity, the lives of extended family and the young couples they teach in the Newlywed and Close (NWC) Life Bible Study.

After completing FPU in 2007, Walter was compelled to pass on to others what he and Julia had learned. So in addition to being a faithful choir member, he led 13 sessions of FPU over the next five years at Houston's First. Avoiding consumer debt is a key FPU precept the Wrights had adopted early and continue to practice. "We both drive older cars," said Walter. "We're driving the ones we've had since before we married —1997 and 2000 year models."

Walter and Julia's intentional planning and personal purchasing decisions are rooted in deeply held convictions of stewardship and a commitment to building the Kingdom of God. Three years ago, they heard Pastor Gregg preach on MISSION 1:8, the two-year generosity initiative at Houston's First, and decided to make a change in their living arrangements. They gave up the lease on their luxury downtown loft, located within walking distance of Minute Maid Park. The 850 square foot condo they moved to is both lovely and in a beautiful part of Houston — but less expensive than the downtown lifestyle.



"We called the condo our MISSION 1:8 house," said Julia. "We loved the loft and the lifestyle, but it was just stuff! Streamlining our lives gave us more flexibility to be generous. It was worth the trade off."

Recently, Walter felt an urgency to invite Julia's parents, who had retired to Florida, back to Texas. "Walter initiated the idea of finding a home where we could live together," Julia explained. They found the perfect home to accommodate two generations in Humble. "It is perfect for us," said Julia. "My parents feel honored and have peace of mind about

Making intentional choices about living simply — building financial margin into their lives — allows the Wrights the luxury of being a blessing to church, to family and beyond the walls of the church. As they closed on the home they now share with Julia's parents they think about the steps of faith it took to get to this point in their lives. "God knew more than we could ever dream," said Walter, "far more than we could ask or imagine."



BACK FROM THE DEAD

Playing a role in *Celebration* reminded a member at the Cypress Campus that nothing is impossible with God.

David Funk heard the buzz about *Celebration*, the musical Christmas presentation at Houston's First, soon after joining the church. As he began discovering all the ministries the church had to offer, he was taken with the mission-mindedness of the church. With that in mind, as David anticipated his first viewing of *Celebration*, and having heard that Santa and his reindeer would be part of the show, he wondered how Santa, Rudolph and Jesus could peacefully coexist in an evangelistic endeavor.

Blown away by what he saw, David signed up the following season to be part of the *Celebration* cast. God had already chosen the perfect part for him to play — a part he had already lived 24 years earlier.

"Celebration was mind-boggling!" said David. "It was not like anything I'd ever seen before." David had never considered himself an actor, though he had done musical theater in the past. But he signed up and was willing to take any role handed to him, whether it meant being part of the cast or taking care of animals.

As it turned out, David had 12 different parts that first year. The most memorable, and the hardest to get through, was the part loosely based on Jairus, who approached Jesus about coming to his home to heal his daughter. They returned to Jairus' home to find his daughter had already died. In his role in *Celebration*, David picked up the girl to give her to Jesus. That scene prompted David to shed real tears.

The scene transported David back 24 years to when his daughter Kendall was only a few months old. She had been fed, changed and put to bed. David and his wife were about to drift off when, without warning, she jumped out of bed and ran to their daughter's crib. The baby had stopped breathing. David's wife performed CPR while he called 911. They told him to head to the hospital, and police and an ambulance would meet them en route. "I ran out of the house carrying the lifeless body of our baby girl in my arms, not knowing if we would ever bring her back home again," said David.

During *Celebration*, memories came flooding back each time David picked up the little girl to give her to Jesus. He hadn't told anyone about his experience



until right before the show was scheduled to begin. John Bolin, Minister of Worship & Arts, shared his story at a cast meeting, so the next time they performed the scene, tears were streaming down the faces of cast members as Jesus received the girl in his arms.

"Marsha Taylor, director of the cast, told me that a lot of prayer goes into choosing the characters in *Celebration*," said David. "When she chose me for the part she had no idea what had happened to our daughter."

Like Jairus' daughter, David's baby girl, Kendall, survived. Now 24 years later, she is working toward a PhD in medical research. "Somewhere in all the frenzied activity a miracle occurred and her heart started beating again," said David. "I know Jairus' anguish; I've felt his agony and hopelessness. I know the tremendous miracle our Lord and Savior gave his family that day."

Celebration brings God's Word to life in a spectacular way, and David is committed to sharing the Gospel through drama and music. He reminds us, "*Celebration* is not just entertainment. It's a ministry."

DRAWN BY THE SPIRIT

Lust and the party life took a back seat to peace after a mountain biking 'bad boy' experienced a real connection with God at MetroLIVE.

Growing up in a Christian home and attending a faith-based school didn't keep Marcus Gillaspia from getting caught up in drugs, alcohol, and women — his life — he says, before coming to know Jesus. As he approached age 30, Marcus visited MetroLIVE, a gathering of college students, singles and married young adults for Bible study and worship at Houston's First.

There, the Spirit of God drew him in and changed his heart and mind about the party life, and church in general.

"I was force-fed religion at the Christian school my parents made me attend," said Marcus. "The judgmental attitude I felt there had the opposite effect of what my parents intended." After being enrolled in a public high school as a teenager, Marcus' rebellion fully bloomed. "I went crazy," he said. "That began my struggle with lust and desire."

In his mid-20s, Marcus began checking out the Christian lifestyle

and he attended MetroLIVE, originally as a way to meet women. But when he saw "the kids" worshiping God and felt the Spirit moving there, Marcus' heart began to change. "I felt a warm, cozy peace," he said. "I knew who God was, but I didn't have a relationship with Jesus until I began attending MetroLIVE."

Marcus, a mountain biker, is wired for all things extreme and lives life at full throttle, including his sports experiences. A wakeboarding incident led to a supernatural healing. Marcus had blown out his knee, and being self-employed with no medical insurance, his mom suggested he attend a church service being held in Texas City. Someone there prayed for healing in

his knee and during the prayer he felt something happening. The following week he attended MetroLIVE and walked in on crutches, unable to put pressure on the knee. Afterward, in the church parking lot, he was able to stand on his own. Suddenly no longer in pain as he had been for months, he even jumped up and down and jogged. Within days, he was able to completely shed the crutches and walk unassisted.

While not all his struggles faded as quickly, Marcus experiences the freedom God gives to those who seek Him. "Everyone's battles are different," said Marcus, "but through them I've felt the tangible presence of God."

He visited several churches and became a member of a nearby congregation for a period of time, but he came back to Houston's First after meeting and marrying his wife, Ashley. "Once we attended together we knew we were home," said Marcus. "The Spirit of God is so strong here, and the leadership is sincere. The Spirit draws us."

NOTHING TO HIDE

Abuse may have robbed a Houston's First staff member of the innocence of childhood, but Jesus redeemed the pain and helped her to like the person she has become.

Lori Smith was "close to being an atheist," she says, when her friend and co-worker Rachel learned about a single adult Life Bible Study, The Shed, at Houston's First more than a decade ago. Were it not for Rachel's encouragement to attend, Lori would have missed the blessing of salvation, self-forgiveness and deliverance from a hate-filled inner struggle stemming from more than 10 years of childhood sexual abuse.



Lori's first worship service at Houston's First was the day Gregg Matte stepped into the pulpit as the new pastor. She and Rachel had already been attending intramurals and The Shed when she had a "wow moment" during a lesson she heard one Sunday.

The subject was forgiveness, a commodity that, in Lori's life, ran in short supply. Christians had been telling Lori for years that she needed to forgive her abuser, but Jerrell Altic, one of her Life Bible Study teachers, counseled her that God was calling her to forgive herself. He explained that only a relationship with Jesus would give her His strength to forgive. "My great-uncle victimized generations of girls in my family, beginning with my mother." Lori's earliest memories of being molested began at age three.

Many emotions and fears plagued her stemming from the abuse. "I never slept well," said Lori. "My parents were hippies who had people partying in the house all the time. My great-uncle wasn't the only man who abused me. I didn't feel safe, so I rarely slept more than an hour or two at a time."

Lori thought much about what Jerrell had said about forgiveness and one night in October 2004 decided to ask Jesus to come into her heart and give her peace. "I slept six hours that night," said Lori, "longer than ever before."

Today, Lori serves as the Business Manager in Culinary Services at The Loop Campus. A self-proclaimed wallflower before trusting Christ, she now is an extrovert. She is comfortable talking to — and in front of — other people, giving her testimony and talking to those who have been through similar circumstances. And unlike those in her extended family, Lori has adopted a joyful attitude. She has also figured out how to set boundaries and has learned to feel comfortable in her own skin.

"Jesus changed how I see the world," she says. "I'm no longer fearful, and I have nothing to hide."
