A TIME TO SOW

Christmas is a time of year that offers believers opportunities to share the message of Christ more naturally than in any other season. HANDMADE HOPE

At Houston's First, being a differencemaker is not limited to adults. Children are also making a difference in our city, our nation, and our world. This holiday season, the Children's Ministry from each campus is opening the Gospel to non-readers, handing out hope through creativity and enterprise.

It's a story seldom heard over the airwaves: Preteens giving 60-70 hours of their time in one month to change lives across an entire nation. Creative sisters Macie, 11, and Alex Gunn, 9, members of First Kids at the Cypress Campus of Houston's First, found a way to share the Good News with people on the other side of the world while spreading a little Christmas cheer close to home.

Each Sunday and Wednesday during the month of October, the Children's Ministry at all campuses took up an offering for Every Village, a ministry partner that gives free solar powered radios to residents in villages throughout South Sudan. The initiative, Radio 10, broadcasts God's Word, news, community development education, and other essential information that reaches approximately 15 villagers for every radio distributed.

"Here, we have Bibles in our homes so we can learn the Word of God," said Kristina Gunn, the girls' mother, "but most people in South Sudan villages can't read. The girls made Christmas ornaments and gift tags to raise money for radios so villagers can hear the Gospel in their own language."

The literacy rate in South Sudan is less than 30 percent, which makes radios an excellent information tool for village residents. The goal for Every Village's Radio 10 ministry this year is to distribute 7,500 handheld radios, which could have an impact on tens of thousands in South Sudan.

"We're so proud of the girls," said Kristina. ""What are we going to do this year?" was their question when they began mulling over ideas to earn money for radios. The girls were the catalyst behind the project."

The girls began crafting in October, giving up TV time and other activities so they could concentrate on creating this year's project. The girls sold handmade bracelets last year for the cause, buying 18 radios after setting an initial target of nine. This

year, they brainstormed with their mom, dad, John Gunn, IT director at Houston's First, and older sister, Madison. They landed on the idea of creating ornaments, a sentimental holiday favorite, from special clay. They rolled out, baked and embossed them with intricate designs, many that included the current year and the ministry name, Every Village.

Macie and Alex produced more than 400 of the beautiful Christmas ornaments and a wide assortment of handmade gift tags that will adorn trees and presents in many Cypress-area homes, and beyond, this season. Through word-of-mouth advertising, the items sold like wildfire — not only in Houston, but also to out-of-town relatives who, in turn, gave them to friends and neighbors. By the end of October, the girls had donated \$1,000, which purchased 50 radios for the South Sudanese, far exceeding last year's goal.

"The way their faces lit up when they found they had earned a radio!" said Kristina. "They both have a missionary spirit."

Love for missions is foundational at Houston's First. With 20 mission trips set for 2016, children and adults alike are being discipled to spread the Gospel in many different ways and in different settings around the world, from the Middle East to San Francisco's Bay Area. There are many ways to participate in missions, and as Macie and Alex have shown, they are making a difference in the lives of South Sudanese while working in the comfort of their own kitchen.

"The girls worked hard," said John, "and providing radios to Every Village allows the girls to see that every dollar they raise makes a tangible impact on people hearing the Gospel."

"I feel like I'm doing something good," said Macie. Alex agrees. "It does feel good to share the Gospel with the help of family and friends," she said.

LOUD AND CLEAR

More than 90 years ago, Houston's oldest Deaf church took root inside the walls of Houston's First. Its members moved to Woodhaven Baptist Church in the 1980s, and it became the first and only Deaf church in the Houston area with its own facility and still is today. Now, differencemakers like Woodhaven member Kathy Adegboye continue to break down walls of silence for the Deaf in the name of Christ.

Spinal meningitis silenced Kathy Glasco's world when she was seven years old. Fingerspelling was her only means of communicating until she learned American Sign Language (ASL) at age 12 while living at the Texas School for the Deaf. Once she learned to sign, Kathy has been a force — bridging the communication gap between the Hearing and Deaf communities and advocating for the hearing impaired by locating jobs and other necessary resources to improve their lives. Now, as a seven-year member at Woodhaven Baptist Deaf Church, Kathy Adegboye, along with her husband Kunle, are active in ministry to spread the Gospel and the love of Christ in a language few can understand.

"Kathy makes a difference in the lives of many as a witness for Christ," said Arthur Craig, pastor of Woodhaven Baptist Deaf Church since 1983. "She is very active in the Deaf community and is highly respected in the church and community."

Employed as an advocate by the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services (DARS), Kathy assists her Deaf clients in finding employment and educational opportunities; gaining access to medical services and devices; and sharing strategies to help them reach their personal and professional goals.

Kunle and Kathy, married just over a year ago, are Tactile Interpreters for deaf and blind members, communicating by signing in the palms of their hands. Kathy also presides over the Woodhaven Women's Ministry, is a music and ASL worship interpreter and singer, and an active prayer team member.

In addition to her regular commitments, Kathy wrote the script and is directing this year's Woodhaven Christmas drama, "Hope, Faith & Giving." The production features Deaf actors, is performed in ASL and voiced for the Hearing in three performances at Woodhaven on the second weekend of December.

If excitement about this year's Christmas production is running at an all-time high, it may be because of the recent \$1 million renovation of Woodhaven's Worship Center, made possible in part by funds from the Houston's First family. The makeover was unveiled at a special service on November 15 and includes a floating floor and state-of-the-art sound system that allows Deaf congregants to "feel" sound. Special lighting and three Image Magnification screens supports optimal viewing for ASL signing during worship services.

"The Deaf are one of the most overlooked people groups in terms of ministry," said Pastor Craig. "Cultural and communication barriers keep them from faith in God through Jesus."

Kathy's own personal experience and 30-plus years as an advocate for the Deaf community gives her a unique perspective on reaching the hearing impaired for Christ and encouraging them to become His disciples. Signing through Dan Mustain, Education Pastor at Woodhaven, Kathy explained, "Our church members have proven that the Deaf can do ministry just like the Hearing. There are all levels of hearing at Woodhaven; some Deaf use ASL and some hear loud sounds, but can't identify spoken language. Whatever their ability, we encourage them to come and get involved."

Services beyond Sunday school and worship at Woodhaven include life skills classes, job placement, food and clothing pantries, addiction recovery classes — and even Deaf Dinner Theater at Woodhaven's Holy Grounds Coffee House.

"The new improvements in the Woodhaven Worship Center will add so much to the worship experience for our deaf, hearing impaired, and deaf and blind members, as well as for members who hear," said Pastor Craig.

In less than a week as the lights dim in the new Worship Center and the curtain goes up on the Christmas drama, Kathy will have the satisfaction of knowing that through her efforts and those of other Woodhaven volunteers, the message of Christ will ring out loud and clear.

KNIT TOGETHER WITH LOVE

God's work is not restricted by the physical limitations of His children. One Houston's First member is proof that when God calls us to join Him in ministry, it's possible to make a difference in people's lives thousands of miles away without ever leaving home.

"He [God] said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me." — 2 Corinthians 12:9

Somewhere in the world this Christmas, 50 needy children will receive a most precious and heartfelt gift. Boys and girls will open their own personal Operation Christmas Child shoebox to find, among other gifts inside, a doll knit together with love by Houston's First member Kathy Pritchett.

Seven years ago, Kathy and her husband Ben, Minister of Education at Houston's First, went on a mission trip that made such an impression on them that they decided it would be one of many more such trips they would take in the future. Before being able to travel again, however, it would be necessary for 57-year-old Kathy to undergo knee replacement surgery.





Ben and Kathy never anticipated that complications from surgery would not only prevent her from going on another mission trip, but would also rob her of mobility and 75 percent of her hearing. After a series of falls, an infection that refused to heal, and a second surgery to remove and replace the knee, Kathy's lengthy stay in a rehabilitation center allowed her to return home. But life would not be as it once was. Kathy's battle with infection would cause her to be confined to bed for the majority of each and every day.

Though Kathy's physical parameters may have been restricted, her ability to make a difference in the lives of others has not. One day last fall while the Pritchetts' granddaughter Lauren was visiting, Kathy watched the 11-year-old knitting on a loom while they talked. Seeing Lauren at work reminded Kathy of 'Comfort Dolls' she had seen displayed for a charitable event earlier that summer. After watching a few YouTube videos, and with Ben's help gathering supplies, Kathy taught herself to knit dolls to give to needy children. "Knitting on a loom is something I can do while lying in bed," Kathy explained. "I can reach out to children who don't have things to play with"

The Pritchetts spent several years packing boxes for Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child, but shopping to fill entire boxes was no longer an option after Kathy's surgeries. When she learned that Samaritan's Purse takes individual items to include in the boxes, she knew how she could help.

Dolls of various nationalities wearing brightly colored clothing, hats or bows are the result of Kathy's tireless work. In spite of having arthritis in her hands, she was able to produce 50 unique dolls over the span of just a couple of months. "I wanted each child to have something special that's one of a kind," she said.

Kathy's passion for children's ministry began in the Pritchetts' hometown of Memphis, where they grew up and fell in love as high school sweethearts in the church youth group. As Ben's full-time ministry took them to Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas, Kathy also volunteered or served on staff in preschool or children's ministry at various churches where the couple had been called.

Children's ministry is a passion, but artistry also runs deep in Kathy's heart and hands. Sewing and ceramics were artistic endeavors she once enjoyed, and while employed at a college she did graphic design work.

As Kathy and Ben can testify, the course life can take is often painful and not always easily understood. But whatever the direction, God receives glory for a willing spirit and a desire to meet the needs of others.

Kathy plans to begin next year's Operation Christmas Child project very soon, and has a goal to create 100 dolls for Samaritan's Purse. Another organization recently approached her about making 50 dolls to send to children in Kenya. There are always more needs present than hands to fill them, but Kathy finds joy in doing her part. "It's a way I can touch people without actually being there," she said.
