GREATER THAN OURSELVES

The identity of Houston's First as a congregation devoted to missions and the spread of the Gospel is rooted in the vision, prayers and generosity of its founders in the early 1800s. These many years later, members are still sacrificing as they hear God's call to give.

Houston's First continues its mission to be a relevant biblical community in principle and practice as it has been since the church was founded 175 years ago. At the end of February, Houston's First wrote its largest check ever in support of missions — \$1,156,100 thanks to church members whose spirit of generosity honors the biblical command of being witnesses "in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8).

Gifts to the World Mission Offering from November 2015 through January 2016 (known this year as Unstoppable Gospel: The Offering) sought to raise funds for three Southern Baptist missionary-sending organizations — the International Mission Board (IMB), the North American Mission Board, and the Southern Baptists of Texas Convention.

The nearly \$1 million given to the IMB is a much-needed blessing after a budget crisis forced them to recall 1,000 missionaries from the field, which was double the original estimate.

"We are seeing a larger number of refugees on the planet today than ever before," said William Taylor, missions pastor at Houston's First. "They're fleeing war-torn countries to places that are open to the Gospel, and they are more receptive to the message. We are living in times where people are being asked to sacrifice in order to spread the Gospel. Houston's First members are continuing the legacy passed to us by early church members: making a difference for the Gospel through the sacrifice of giving."

While the Houston's First family gave generously to these missionary-sending groups, ongoing financial support for our church is essential as well. Each week, several thousand men, women, and children gather at our five campuses and are "sent out" to be Differencemakers in our "Jerusalem" — at home, at work, at school, and in the community. While being a missionary often involves crossing borders, it can also mean simply crossing the street.


"Our church family sees giving to missions as a way to be part of something greater than ourselves, a way to be part of a worldwide movement in the kingdom of God," said William. "The generosity of the Houston's First family enables us to support missionaries on the field, but it also ensures that the day-to-day ministry of the church continues as we equip people to be Differencemakers for the Gospel."

Spring is the time to plant seeds for a lush summer garden. In this issue, Houston's First members are planting seeds for another purpose. Some will bear fruit in the here and now, and some may lie dormant for many seasons. We plant and water, but God makes it grow.

READY FOR TAKEOFF

Ever wonder how God births a ministry in the hearts and minds of one of His children? First Wheels Special Needs Mobility Ministry at Houston's First is a case study in how innate talent, following a dream and obeying God's leadership work together to make a difference in the lives of special needs children.

Houston's First member Blake Palmer's childhood fascination for constructing model airplanes laid the groundwork for a "dream" second career. But more than that, God opened Blake's eyes to the unique — and unexpected — way he could use his talents to be a Differencemaker in the lives of special needs children at Houston's First

After more than 15 years in the corporate world, a layoff prompted Blake to begin contemplating life's priorities. "About the same time, I lost my job, turned 40 and got saved," he said. "I began to see God at work

and around the country.

making things happen."

Doors opened to revisit his love for tinkering with airplanes. He started to enroll in school to become an airplane mechanic, but through divine providence and volunteering at Galveston's Lone Star Flight Museum, Blake made a connection that allowed him to work and apprentice as an airplane mechanic at a drilling company.

After being laid off in 2009, the next 15 jobless months would be a challenge for both Blake and his wife, Gretchen, who was carrying the family finances. "We knew God had taken care of us before," said Blake.

In answer to a Craigslist ad, Blake sent his resume to an antique airplane restoration shop in Cypress. He showed up the following Monday to talk with the owner, and they hit it off. Six years later, he still sings the praises of his workplace. "Restoring antique aircraft is the best job I've ever had," he said. He had already learned a bit about fabricating in his prior job, a valuable skill in the restoration business, and one God would also use in ministry going forward.

Two years ago, a classmate in The Bridge Life Bible Study — and Blake's Facebook friend — posted a video from Go Baby Go, an organization that provides mobility to kids who have trouble moving around on their own. The video showed toy ride-on cars that had been modified to allow disabled kids to use them. "When I saw the video, I knew it was something I had to do," said Blake. "This was something I was supposed to do."

Blake made screenshots of the videos and started researching. Though Blake and Gretchen have no children and no experience working with children, they are the focus of his ministry. His first car was completed in the summer of 2014 and was

given to a young boy at Houston's First with cerebral palsy. "I saw his face light up," said Blake. "There's nothing I've experienced or anything I could spend money on in this world that would mean as much as that."

> His newfound ministry manifested in building cars "God-style." Most of the adapted cars Blake saw were quickly put together with little attention given to detail. "My philosophy is the cars be well-built," he said. "We even personalize them with the child's name on Texas license plates." A Houston's First member sewed custom seat covers for one vehicle. "It meant so much to the child's mom," said Blake, "that some lady she didn't even know would take the time."

He ordered six different types of switches to determine which worked best to power the cars. After interviewing robotics specialists, doing online research, and tinkering with microprocessors, Blake invented the Fluid Motion Device, a speed control to accelerate and slow the vehicle to a stop without jerking the child, as is the norm with standard motorized riding toys.

Darwin had been battling what he thought was

a harmless infection. A biopsy and two surgeries later showed that he had cancer at the base of his tongue in his throat. In spite of 35 rounds of radiation and seven chemo treatments that lasted through the end of last year, Darwin and Yolanda moved forward on the idea put forward by Ashland Gardens' director to begin church services for its residents.

days, Darwin longed once again for an opportunity to minister to others. And though Yolanda had always been active in churches every stop along the way during her 20-year Air Force career, the couple had been praying for a ministry that would allow them to work together to make a difference for Christ.

"Elderly members at the church are well taken care of," said Darwin, "but I wasn't aware of any outreach to the elderly being done outside the church."

After a short hiatus from ministry to senior adults and youth while Darwin and

Yolanda attended Life Bible Study, the first break since God's call during his college

Darwin's call to ministry came during college, and as a Navy man, he had taken every opportunity to minister to students or retirees in local nursing homes when he shipped in to port in various countries or while on "liberty."

During the course of his studies, Darwin majored in communications and theology and later worked bi-vocationally as a journalist while leading small churches in Louisiana and Illinois that had no funds to pay a full-time pastor. He had interned at the New York Times and worked as a journalist in several large media outlets in those states and around the country while knocking on doors, ministering in nursing homes, and getting involved with "unchurched" youth and their families.

Last year, about the time Darwin and Yolanda began praying for ways to reach out in ministry, his small Green Technology business took him to Ashford Gardens, an elder care facility with 132 residents in Northwest Houston. Once he finished his presentation with the director, the subject of church came up. She was looking for someone to offer church services for residents. The timing couldn't have been better — or so they thought.

With spare money from his family budget and a few generous donors, First Wheels

"I don't know where it's going to lead," said Blake. "For me, it's all about being obedient to do what God wanted me to do. Everything I ever learned in my life has come together for this."

OUTSIDE THE WALLS

After a year of being fed spiritually in a Life Bible Study at the Cypress Campus, Darwin and Yolanda Campbell still felt something missing in their lives. A well-timed business appointment at a local retirement community opened a door to minister to elderly residents outside the walls of the church — even as cancer came knocking.

> "We refused to put the Lord's work on hold," said Darwin. "We determined that whatever the ailment, God is stronger." He was no stranger to health problems; an arrhythmia in 2005 required the implantation of a pacemaker to stabilize his heart rhythm. "God has things for me to do," said Darwin. During chemo treatments, he and Yolanda began teaching Bible lessons, leading worship, and visiting and praying with residents one-on-one. "Two residents have accepted Christ since we began," he said. "We reach out to residents, their family members and Ashford Garden employees to share the Gospel." When they began visiting Ashford Gardens in October, 15 residents

came. Attendance has doubled since then.

Their ministry to residents has become a family affair since their 13-year-old son Patrick got hooked after his first visit. Yolanda was moved by Patrick's empathy for the elderly residents. "He said, 'I didn't know they didn't have many visitors," recalls Yolanda. "Patrick began looking forward to interacting with the seniors after that."

In addition to providing worship services for Ashford Garden residents, the Campbells get their Life Bible Study classmates and other Houston's First members involved in the ministry. They make lap guilts to distribute to residents and each holiday the seniors receive special baskets with treats and a Gospel tract so they can celebrate the season with a fun surprise.

> "Differencemakers is the best series Pastor Gregg could have done to motivate others for the cause of Christ," said Darwin. He and Yolanda hope to expand their ministry to other nursing homes across the city. They most recently had a request to bring services to a retirement community on T. C. Jester, not far

> on Darwin's cancer treatments, they continue the ministry that God handed to them for such a time as this. "God laid it on our hearts to revitalize our ministry to senior adults," said Darwin. "We want to shine the light of Jesus to these residents while at the same time being motivators to get others involved in the community. They really can make a difference."

BLESSED ARE THE PIECEMAKERS

Being a Differencemaker takes shape in a variety of ways. A small gathering of ladies whose intent each week is to meet together to quilt, knit or sew is also having a positive effect on the lives of little girls in a land whose government was once a military adversary. But with God, all things are possible.

Handmade quilts, blankets for young patients at Texas Children's Hospital, knitted caps for preemies, lap blankets for local long-term care facilities and retirement homes, and for the past two years, "pillowcase dresses" for needy Cambodian children and orphans — that's what hearts and hands in the Houston's First Piecemakers Ministry are stitching together. Just about every Wednesday morning during the school year, women ages 30 to 90 can be found handcrafting expressions of love for people spanning from the metro area to a riverside town on the other side of the world.

"Last year, Piecemakers made dresses for little girls in Kratié, Cambodia, on the banks of the Mekong River," said Carol Pierce, Piecemakers' leader and devotional facilitator for the past nine years. "We're always looking for ideas for ministry projects."

Ann Zallar, a Piecemakers member and quilter, knew her longtime friend and Houston's First member Terri Toy had delivered 75 dresses for little girls living in Kratié, where her 20-year old daughter Allison, a nursing student, and Terri's husband, a doctor, led a Houston's First medical mission trip in 2014.

Allison, her dad, and seven others traveled to Kratié, and in four locations offered basic medical check ups, vitamins, and drugs for high blood pressure, diabetes and other illnesses treated with medications readily available for patients in the United States, but difficult to obtain in rural Cambodia. In addition, the team worked in conjunction with a local Filipino missionary, his church, and in concert with a hospital to teach everything from basic first aid to neonatal resuscitation. The team was able to see 100 patients each day and, through an interpreter, shared the Gospel during each encounter.

The following year, the size of the missions team from Houston's First nearly doubled. They traveled back to Kratié and the Piecemakers volunteered to make the little girls' dresses. Ann, Carol and the rest of the group thought making 75 pillowcase dresses to be a worthy goal, but instead, enthusiasm for the project and a heightened sense of purpose led the women to deliver 90 instead.

"These ladies embraced this project," said Terri. "They made more dresses than they ever imagined!"

The women are readying their needles again this year to sew dresses that the Houston's First team can deliver when they leave for Kratié in May. They will join Allison and another girl from Houston's First who were called by God to return to Kratié a few months ago on extended mission trips, six months and one year, respectively. The local missionary told Terri that he sees the girls at the market from time to time and they are usually wearing the dresses the Piecemakers made for them.

"Some can't go, but they can sew," said Terri. "Sewing for children around the world — it's a practical way to show the love of Christ."





READY FOR TAKEOFF (continued)

A young mother from Chicago saw the vehicles on the Thru the Roof Special Needs Ministry Facebook page and contacted ministry founder Denise Briley, the former director, now the ministry's Family Liaison. Denise made the connection between Blake and the woman's one-year-old with spina bifida, who received a tiny Bumbo wheelchair last year. Blake retrofitted a Bumbo Floor Seat with the base of a Dareway Scooter, using the platform as a wheelchair base and adding a long handle that allowed the baby's mom to push her around the house and into tight spaces as well as outdoors.

"Blake has become the hands and feet for these kids," said Denise. "He is giving families their dream. By using the incredible gifts God has given him, Blake is giving kids with special needs the mobility that every parent wants their child to have. Now they can keep up with their brothers and sisters."

has gifted a total of five vehicles to special needs children. Blake says the groundwork has been laid for the ministry now that he has learned how things are done and believes this is just the beginning of First Wheels' ministry of making children with special needs mobile.
