

BARRIERS TO FAITH

Suspended between earth and heaven, Jesus took His last breath, and in an instant all barriers between man and God were torn down. The earth quaked, rocks split, graves opened — and the temple curtain ripped from top to bottom. Christ's death and resurrection offer power over death — and eternal life. Freedom is waiting for all who put their faith in Him. These Houston's First members experienced healing, transformation and freedom from barriers between them and God that they once considered insurmountable.

BROKEN HOME

"Children who live absent their biological fathers are, on average, at least two to three times more likely to be poor, to use drugs, to experience educational, health, emotional and behavioral problems...."—The Fatherless Generation

"I had no model of manhood," said Wiley Moss, whose parents split when he was 10. "My dad was an alcoholic, abusive and angry. My mother moved my sisters and me to East Texas to start over and I became the man of the family."

Wiley's new home was near a Baptist church, where his next-door neighbor taught Sunday school and had a son Wiley's age. He heard a message that resonated in his wounded 10 year-old heart: God could take away the pain he felt from his broken home. He accepted Christ. "Even so, I made bad choices at my young age, and was a troublemaker." he said.

In spite of a wild youth that lasted through his early 20s, Wiley landed a goodpaying job in the oil industry that also paid for his education. It gave him a feeling of accomplishment and offered him a lifestyle he had always hoped for. "My life was about consumption and pleasure," he said. "Working, partying, sexual immorality and possessions were hidden beneath a facade of 'having it all.' I was an addict depressed and lonely."


The handwriting was on the wall in the oil industry and he began drinking more to numb the pain of job loss. Non-stop partying and job loss sent Wiley's life spiraling out of control. "The night of my roommate's birthday I made really bad choices," said Wiley. "I'm thankful I didn't get arrested."

Wiley had lost 60 pounds and was in poor health when a guy at the gym suggested he go to Alcoholics Anonymous. "I was also having an internal dialogue and remembered what I had learned at church," said Wiley. "Drinking not only affected my health, but all my relationships."

He moved back to Houston and began attending church. It took five months to get sober and Wiley was baptized, ironically, on Father's Day 2015. "My dad had been in prison for years and was released in 2016." he said. "God is Father to the fatherless. and He loves us, is patient, and He's full of mercy."

The Porch Live, a worship gathering for singles meeting at Houston's First at The Loop Campus, drew Wiley in. He also began attending dinner gatherings for singles and then worship services at Houston's First. He joined a Life Bible Study and found joy in the community he had found and the building of his faith.

"When oil hit rock bottom, so did I. I lost everything except the time to reflect on what I'd done," said Wiley. "I knew I didn't deserve it, but I needed mercy. I've grown in compassion, and my relationships are better. I don't live in darkness anymore; I have a walk with Christ."



GOD HATES ME

Where is God when evil breaks our hearts? "The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit." (Psalm 34:18) One Houston's First member is walking again with the Lord after a violent act drove a wedge between her heart and His.

"I was a straightlaced rule follower," said Laura Rensberger. "I had always gone to church and never doubted God's existence, but I didn't have a relationship with Christ."

When Laura experienced the newfound freedom of college, church attendance began to dwindle. "I had my parents' faith — not my own," she said. Laura followed the boy she had dated since the high school youth group to college and they continued dating, though he had become increasingly verbally abusive. She hid the deteriorating relationship from her family and vowed to keep up appearances as the "perfect couple."

Laura's boyfriend graduated a year before she did, and she ventured into unfamiliar territory. The long distance relationship grew worse and she found solace and attention at local bars, where college students spent many evenings.

Laura was sexually assaulted during her senior year. "'I wondered, how could God have let this happen?" she said. "Feelings of worthlessness overcame me. God hates me, and this was my punishment, I thought."

Laura decided she would give God a reason to hate her and rebelled by accelerating her party lifestyle. The five-year relationship with her boyfriend ended for good and Laura decided to move to her cousin's in Indiana. One night at a bar, God spoke audibly to her, when she wasn't drinking. She had been observing a very intoxicated girl and judging her for her drunkenness.

"I heard, 'That's who you're becoming,'" said Laura. "'That's not who I created you to be.' I looked around to see who had said it. I saw no one, but I knew Who it was."

Back at her cousin's apartment, Laura opened the Bible to the Psalms and began reading. She decided to move back to Houston and searched online for a church. At church she found no shame and guilt, but instead, she found a real relationship with Christ, not an extension of her parents' faith.

A year later, she attended a Saturday night church service and all the seats were filled. The pastor said church members had been praying for a year that their half-filled auditorium would be full of people. A realization hit Laura: "God had people praying for me to come back during the darkest time in my life."

The wall between her and God was crumbling and she began attending Houston's First, received counseling and experienced God's forgiveness as she was learning to forgive Him. "I had also become dependent on alcohol," she said. "As I prayed and began letting God in, it just didn't taste good to me anymore."

Feelings of worthlessness were changing as she dug into the truths of God's Word. "I believe I was fearfully and wonderfully made as Psalm 139 says," she said.



Laura found a kindred soul in a Bible study. She, too, had been assaulted and the young women found friendship and support in freely talking about their experiences and praying through rough spots together.

Volunteering with other single adults at Houston's First has been a blessing that has aided in the recovery of her self-worth. "Feeling worthy is a daily battle," said Laura. "I ask myself who I'm going to believe. I choose to believe I'm fearfully and wonderfully made. I'm a daughter of the King."

NO NEED FOR GOD

One Houston's First Cypress Campus member had little use for God until he got a glimpse of his own mortality. His heart began opening to the love of God after discovering He had a purpose for his life.

Houston's First member Jason Odenthal was raised as a Catholic with a God-fearing mother who made sure the family attended church. But at age seven, Jason's heroinaddicted dad left the family. The boy adopted a rebellious, self-sufficient attitude that set the tone for his life nearly two decades.

"I worshiped myself and felt I didn't need God for anything," said Jason. "I was living my own life, making my own money and didn't feel like rules applied to me." But God gave him a reprieve in his 20s that drove home the point that maybe all things were not under his control.

Working as a "repo guy," Jason had planned to ride along with his employer to do a job until his daughter spiked a fever two hours before the trip. He backed out of the job and heard four hours later that the vehicle he would have been riding in was involved in a terrible accident. The guy who took his place was killed — sitting in the seat where he would have been.

That got Jason's attention. Soon after, his sister invited him to attend a "40 Days of Purpose" class at her church to study Purpose Driven Life by Rick Warren. He began attending the church, and there he met Katie. The two were friends for eight years before dating seriously, and within six months they were married. Not only did Jason find his soul mate there, but he also found Christ. "I recognized what a hard heart I had for 23 years of my life," he said. "It was no way to live."

Jason's sister and her husband had begun attending the Cypress Campus of Houston's First and invited Jason and Katie to visit. They loved the church and the entire family decided to get baptized together on the same day. "We were baptized in November last year as a family," said Jason. "I feel more loved than ever in my life. I can't imagine living without God. Now I feel alive."


WHAT BARRIERS FIRST KEPT YOU FROM GOD?
